Librarians Growing Places!

On June 13, 2008 several ACRL/NY members gathered at the LuEsther T. Mertz Library of the New York Botanical Garden. Stephen Sinon, Head of Information Services and Archives, graciously and enthusiastically guided our group through the library. First we toured the adjacent William D. Rondina and Giovanni Foroni LoFaro Gallery, where the exhibit Darwin's Garden: An Evolutionary Adventure displayed manuscripts, letters, and plant specimens from the library's collection of Darwiniana. Librarians at the New York Botanical Garden curate all exhibits in this exhibition space. We were shown the reference and reading rooms of the Mertz Library, appealing, spacious places to read, study, or browse. We visited the Rare Book and Folio Room and viewed several breathtaking folios of botanical illustrations. The Mertz Library defines a "rare book" as any pre-Linnaean book; that is, published before 1753.

The tour concluded with the opportunity to meet with technical services librarians and tour the closed stacks and technical services work areas.

The Mertz Library is arguably the library of record for print and electronic resources on all gardening, botanical, and horticultural topics. An impressive array of digitization projects are underway, including the Digital Library, digitized rare books from the library's collection, and the Virtual Herbarium, a collection of plant specimen data and images. The catalog and digitized collections can be searched online: <http://library.nybg.org/>. The library also maintains a Plant Information Service for home gardeners. Plant information specialists respond to the public's questions pertaining to gardening in the southeastern New York Region via email, phone, fax, and postal mail.

The Mertz Library is open to all visitors to the New York Botanical Garden. NYBG membership entitles members to use the library and borrow from its collection of circulating books. Any librarian with an interest in botanical subjects or an interest in digitization, preservation, conservation, or metadata would find a visit fascinating.

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Wiki Wonders

The ACRLNY Executive Board is enhancing communication with our new wiki. We created it using PBwiki, a free hosting site that offers advertisement-free wikis for education. Wikis are great professional development tools. Ours provides a place for collaborative writing as well as posting of announcements, minutes, documents, links and photos. Currently, we are using our wiki to revise the bylaws. As each board member posts her changes to a particular section, everyone is able to view and comment. The history feature of the wiki allows us to compare versions and revert to earlier iterations if so desired. We no longer have deal with multiple versions of a document crossing in our email.

As with all PBwikis, we had the option to make the executive board wiki public or private. Since the contents are sometimes sensitive, we chose to make it private; only those with the password can view or edit the contents. Public wikis are visible to all, but still may not be edited or changed without the correct password. If you have not tried a wiki, check out pbwiki.com and explore the possibilities.

Long Island Section Hosts Workshop

The Long Island Section hosted a workshop, MARKETING LIBRARY RESOURCES AND SERVICES: LET THEM KNOW WHAT YOU'VE GOT!, on Friday, May 9, 2008 at Adelphi University, Garden City, NY.

Some 40 attendees listened to presentations by Darren Chase, Informatics Librarian, Health Sciences Library, Stony Brook University on how to promote and encourage the use of your library's information literacy and instructional programs to faculty; Karen Gisonny, Helen B. Bernstein Librarian for Periodicals & Journals, New York Public Library on how to showcase your collections by organizing reading programs and events built around them; Debbi Smith, Collection Development and Management Librarian, Adelphi University on how to create a marketing campaign to promote awareness of library resources and services, and Joseph Balsamo, Assistant Director of Information Systems, Health Sciences Library, Stony Brook University on how to use statistics of virtual library collections to adjust services to targeted audiences. Participants in the workshop engaged with the speakers with follow up questions, and it was a great opportunity to network with fellow area librarians.

Clickers in Libraries, a program discussing the use of clickers in library classes was held on Friday, April 4th at Westchester Community College in conjunction with the ACRL/NY Westchester Section and WALDO's Information Services. Leah Massar Bloom, Reference Coordinator, Social and Natural Sciences Librarian of Purchase College Library spoke how to get started with clickers. Mari Miller-Lamb, Reference /Instruction Librarian of Long Island University, Brooklyn Campus Library spoke on how clickers did or did not fit into assessment. Betsy Crenshaw, Reference/Health Science Librarian of Long Island University Library spoke on some of the technical challenges associated with clickers. Anne Leonard Instruction / Reference Librarian of New York City College of Technology Library spoke on evaluating clickers for library use. A question and answer session followed. In comments afterwards, participants expressed appreciation for the real world perspective presented by the speakers.
